Remembering Rhoda February 23, 1933 - February 3, 2024



Rhoda Redleaf's extraordinary life has shown the way for so many of us to follow in her bright light. When Rhoda saw a need, she always found a solution.

Rhoda Eileen Redleaf lived a beautiful and productive life. At Sarah Lawrence College, Rhoda began her lifelong dedication to Early Childhood Education. She and her husband Paul had four children to whom she was very devoted.

A Spirit of BOND award recipient, Rhoda ardently served BOND in multiple ways, including as president. She established our Early Childhood Education Fund, and true to form, did not want recognition for her efforts; Rhoda named the fund for her good friend and fellow early childhood educator, Erna Fishhaut.

This fund supported children from disadvantaged backgrounds to attend Early Childhood Education programs, thereby helping to bridge the educational divide and prepare students for first grade. Volunteers from BOND made most of the educational materials used in those programs and spent time in the classroom as teachers' aides.

In 1971, Rhoda co-led the creation of the first Head Start program in the Twin Cities. BOND's Patti Baskin, Marilyn Marker, and I, Millie Segal, all worked in this program in subsequent years.

The first book Rhoda published was "Open the Door, Let's Explore More". She went on to publish six more books about early childhood development. Rhoda was a tireless board member and staff member of Think Small. In the 1990s Think Small renamed their press division to Redleaf Press, in her honor, and it is now a nationally recognized publishing company.

Rhoda's vision, enthusiasm, boundless energy, and commitment have had an immeasurable and lasting impact on so many lives. The positive changes she made will continue to radiate light.
